Our own **Dr. Sanders** is going to be presenting his doctoral research at the upcoming Association for Educational Communications and Technology International Convention, *Towards Culturally-Situated Learning Design and Research* this November.

The title of his presentation is *Critical Techno Constructivism: Toward a Unified Computer Learning Theory*. Please see below for a short description.

In celebration of LatinX Heritage Month, Friday's All-School Virtual Chapel brought together the entire school community, along with some very special guests. The service opened with a prelude by guitarist, David Ellis, and set the tone for what would be a moving and meaningful service for all. We also heard from St. James' incredible Choir. Kudos to Mr. Casey and Ms. Cartagena for crafting such an impressive and estimable music program that contributed so beautifully to our service.

We are grateful to our service participants and panelists for their leadership: Rebecca (sixth grade), Victoria (third grade), Jeremy (fourth grade), Katharine (fifth grade), who read *The Prayers of The People* entirely in Spanish, Pyper (fifth grade), who recited *The Lord's Prayer* entirely in Spanish, and Lexi (fifth grade) read the Concluding Collect in Spanish as well.

Maestra Diaz gave the homily and reminded us that we are beautiful, spiritual beings created by God, and that we must never forget that. As children of God, we must never allow ourselves to think we are less than or unworthy; as children of God, we must also never forget that we are not alone; we are part of something bigger than ourselves. As children of God, we have a duty to care for one another and to look out for each other and be kind.

Maestra's message tied beautifully to the scripture reading from Philippians:

Por tanto, si sienten algún estímulo en su unión con Cristo, algún consuelo en su amor, algún compañerismo en el Espíritu, algún afecto entrañable, 2 llénenme de alegría teniendo un mismo parecer, un mismo amor, unidos en alma y pensamiento. 3 No hagan nada por egoísmo o vanidad; más bien, con humildad consideren a los demás como superiores a ustedes mismos.

So if there is any encouragement in Christ, any comfort from love, any participation in the Spirit, any affection and sympathy, complete my joy by being of the same mind, having the same love, being in full accord and of one mind. Do nothing from rivalry or conceit, but in humility count others more significant than yourselves. Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others. Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus.

What was clear throughout the service is that no matter the language or the culture, we are all children of God. And, as Mr. Reinke always reminds us, as children of God, "We are blessed and highly favored."






## STUDENT SPOTLIGHT



"Yo Soy" - Joelle, 4th Grade


